Anne Glauber's Legacy



DEAR FRIENDS,

ancreatic cancer is rapidly becoming the second leading cause of cancer deaths in the United States. It's so insidious that most people don't realize they have the disease until it has spread.

In the wake of a stage IV diagnosis in May 2014, our friend and co-founder, Anne Glauber, wanted reliable information at her fingertips. She wanted to learn about treatment options beyond "standard of care," and to connect with doctors and scientists who were primed to change the trajectory of the disease. She wanted a reason to hope.

When Anne couldn't readily find top pancreatic cancer experts online, or even understand the science enough to identify the best treatment protocols, she set out to change the pancreatic cancer landscape with Let's Win. Since its inception in 2016, this unique online platform has become a safe haven of trusted information and a repository of positive stories and information about new treatments.

An expert communicator, Anne wanted to bring together doctors, researchers, community leaders, and donors to advance knowledge within the pancreatic cancer space — to share fast-breaking

information on potentially life-saving pancreatic cancer treatments and clinical trials. She also wanted to ensure that no patient would ever again face a pancreatic cancer diagnosis without resources and hope.

Although Anne passed away in 2017, she won!

Anne found doctors willing to challenge the standard of care, and she recruited one of the best — Dr. Allyson Ocean of Weill Cornell Medical Center — to serve as Let's Win's Co-Founder and Scientific Advisory Board Chair. Together, they identified leading scientists helping patients access better treatment options today while simultaneously increasing participation in research to improve outcomes tomorrow.

As we mark our 5th anniversary, Let's Win has secured its position as a source of reliable information for pancreatic cancer patients. The community is getting more robust every day, with support from such thought leaders as President Joe Biden and former President Jimmy Carter, as well as a battalion of doctors and scientists who are developing innovative strategies to combat pancreatic cancer.

But we're just getting started. The devastating reality is that this disease continues to strike without warning and does not discriminate. Even more concerning is the fact that medically underserved populations, such as the Black and Latinx communities, are at a higher risk of developing the disease.

Anne's wish was for ALL patients to have access to the best care available, regardless of race, color, demographic, or language. With that vision, Let's Win will continue to lead the way forward to change the pancreatic cancer narrative by raising awareness of clinical trials and reaching out to underserved populations around the world. None of this would be possible without your generous support. We are profoundly grateful.

t an early meeting for Let's
Win, when Founding Executive
Director Cindy Gavin heard the
plan to publish a new story
every three business days,
she worried that this schedule
would be difficult to meet. But thanks to the
commitment of the science community, there
has been no shortage of research to report on.

Since May 2016 we have published more than 450 original articles about the latest research into new treatments, clinical trials, and patients pursuing different protocols, plus 40 videos featuring long-term survivors. All information is vetted by medical experts.

The response from the pancreatic cancer community has been powerful. Our website has had almost 600,000 visitors and 1.6 million page views.

"Our goal has always been to connect patients to the researchers, doctors, and survivors who can give them reason to hope — not just because there is reason to hope, but because having a positive attitude helps patients fight the disease," says Allyson Ocean, M.D.

We are a beacon of hope for pancreatic cancer patients, family members, and the doctors and researchers who serve them. Our website is a clean, simple platform that provides content in these key categories:



My Treatment

Patients share their personal journey with pancreatic cancer, including information about novel treatment options and clinical trials. They also share what inspires them and how they manage life after treatment.



Promising Science

Pancreatic cancer research and treatment is continuously evolving. Our expert science writers interview physicians and scientists about ongoing research into innovative treatment options.



Clinical Trials

Let's Win helps patients navigate the complicated clinical trial system with user-friendly animations that explain how trials work and how to find and apply for clinical trials. The section also features descriptions of current active trials.

Managing Pancreatic Cancer

Patients and caregivers look for educational information about pancreatic cancer and support during treatment, plus information about maintaining their quality of life, including:

- Staying comfortable during and after chemotherapy
- Meeting nutritional needs

Video Library

Our Survivor Video Series shares inspirational videos from long-term pancreatic cancer patients who have survived more than five years. Our video library also includes informational animations and Let's Win public service announcements.

Survivors Tell Their Stories



A source of hope and inspiration for patients and caregivers.

cornerstone of our mission is to inspire hope among pancreatic cancer patients. The Let's Win Survivor Video Series delivers, providing patients and loved ones with evidence that you can survive a pancreatic cancer diagnosis.

"What many pancreatic cancer patients don't realize is that there are more treatment options for pancreatic cancer now than ever before," says Allyson Ocean, M.D. "Through these inspirational videos, viewers learn about the latest scientific breakthroughs and clinical trials from the patients who experienced them firsthand. They learn that despite tough odds and toxic treatments, people do survive pancreatic cancer."

Inspired by the late Juliette Gimon and created with generous support from the Flora Family Foundation, Let's Win's Survivor Video Series features diverse survivors while also shining a light on researchers who are moving the needle for pancreatic cancer treatments.

Since launching in January 2018, the series has featured 40 videos of 33 survivors, three research facilities, and four montages. Videos are posted on the Let's Win website and circulated on Facebook and YouTube, and have been viewed more than 550,000 times. Featured survivors share them through their own channels as well. Our filmmaker was able to continue working even during the COVID-19 pandemic, capturing inspirational videos from survivors all over the country using remote technology.

Meet some of our survivors.

Scott Nelson, 17-Year Survivor Steve Nelson, 4-Year Survivor

After their mother was diagnosed with breast cancer related to a BRCA2 mutation, Scott (left) and Steve Nelson learned they carried the same mutation. But they didn't know that BRCA2 increased their risk of developing pancreatic cancer.

When Scott was diagnosed with the disease, surgery was not an immediate option because of the tumor's location. His doctor thought a clinical trial might shrink the tumor enough to make surgery possible. The trial worked and Scott had a Whipple procedure.

After Scott's diagnosis, three of his siblings joined the Cancer of the Pancreas Screening Study (CAPS) program. Oldest brother Steve's initial testing revealed a pancreatic neuroendocrine tumor and a cyst on the head of his pancreas, both initially noncancerous. Closer screening at regular intervals caught changes in the cells that indicated cancer was developing. Steve had surgery and was back to normal in two months.

G. Paris Johnson, 17-Year Survivor

After suffering from excruciating abdominal pain, G. Paris Johnson received a devastating diagnosis: pancreatic cancer. She never faltered, focusing instead on laughing through her pain. Paris believes her mission in life is to remind people that being diagnosed with pancreatic cancer is not a death sentence. "My scars are somebody else's healing," she says. "I need to let people know that I'm here. I survived." Paris wants to make sure that what she calls her "dash"— the time between her birth and her eventual passing—has meaning.

Rachel Moreno, 6-Year Survivor

Rachel Moreno learned she had pancreatic cancer after a car accident landed her in the hospital. Unfortunately, her local doctors offered Rachel no hope, prescribing standard treatment. Rachel pushed back, seeking a second opinion at the University of Michigan, closer to where her son lived. There she learned about a clinical trial that included a new investigational drug. The treatment shrunk her tumor enough for it to be surgically removed. "Living is what interested me," Rachel says. "I learned to speak up. You can win this fight. It's not the death sentence it used to be."



Worldwide Collaboration

With Scientific Advisory Board members across the country and around the world, even as far away as Israel, Let's Win is uniquely positioned to amplify the great work underway across the globe.

In just five years, Let's Win has highlighted the work of over 250 physicians and scientists as they try to move the needle for pancreatic cancer patients. We feature research funded by

the Lustgarten Foundation and the **Pancreatic Cancer Collective partners Stand Up to Cancer** (SU2C) and Pancreatic Cancer Canada, as well as the work funded by **Pancreatic Cancer** Action Network (PanCAN) and many more. Let's Win also partners with organizations like The Basser Center for BRCA to communicate the role of BRCA mutations in both the diagnosis and treatment of pancreatic cancer.

Collaboration is another key aspect of partnership. In 2016, Let's Win joined the launch of the World Pancreatic Cancer Coalition (WPCC), which brings together more than 95 advocacy organizations representing 35 countries to raise awareness and advance research. Gavin co-chaired the 2018, 2019, and 2020 meetings, conferring a leadership role on Let's Win in the WPCC.

Building Community

Partnership goes beyond treatment. Let's Win has joined with organizations that are proactively engaging underserved populations. We share stories on social media with the **Elvin** Howard, Sr. Pancreatic Cancer Advocacy Foundation. In 2019, the organizations joined forces to release a public service announcement (PSA) to raise awareness of pancreatic cancer in people of color.

PancChat

A monthly Twitter chat has created a global pancreatic cancer conversation.

n the third Tuesday of each month, healthcare providers, patients, and caregivers from around the world meet on Twitter for PancChat. This live,

hour-long monthly Twitter conversation harnesses the power of social media to allow patients, family members, and healthcare providers to converse in real time with the top pancreatic cancer doctors and scientists.

Each month's PancChat focuses on a different topic, ranging from clinical trials to early detection. The doors open at 8 p.m. Eastern Time in a questionand-answer format. Examples include:

- · How do clinical trials work?
- · What is the connection between BRCA and pancreatic cancer?

PancChat has been under the purview of Let's Win almost since its inception in April 2016. Partners include:

- · The Lustgarten Foundation
- Pancreatic Cancer Action Network
- Oncologists and pancreatic cancer researchers across the globe

Participants not only include patients and caregivers, but also professional cancer research societies and advocacy organizations. Together, participants discuss some of the most important topics in pancreatic cancer research and treatment.

The hashtag #PancChat is showing up across the internet as a way to advance awareness of pancreatic cancer.

Our Milestones

May 2016

Let's Win launched as an affiliate of the Lustgarten Foundation, with 15 stories and a mandate to connect pancreatic cancer patients and doctors to the best treatment options and clinical trials.



Since Let's Win was founded in 2016, there have been many seminal moments in our fight against pancreatic cancer. Here are some of them.

December 2016

Our leadership team traveled to Georgia to invite former President Jimmy Carter, who lost his sisters and brother to pancreatic cancer, to be honorary chair of our Advisory Committee. The visit culminated in a PSA, which was filmed in February 2017.

September 2017

We were inducted into the PR News Platinum Hall of Fame for inspiring communications to better serve pancreatic cancer patients, their families, and all those touched by the disease.

November 2017

We added enhancements to the Let's Win website, including the new Managing Pancreatic Cancer section for information about the disease and how to manage life during treatment.

January 2018

The inspirational Survivor Video Series launched. As of mid-2021, we have featured 33 survivors and three research centers, and have shown four montages.

August 2018

Let's Win's **501c3 status was** approved, making us an official 501(c)(3) nonprofit foundation.

September 2018

We were the recipient of the first Biden Cancer Initiative FIERCE Award for "Leadership through Exemplary and Awesome Purpose (LEAP)."

November 2018

To mark World Pancreatic Cancer Day, we launched a Spanish version of Let's Win, with monthly updated content. The Let's Win board, along with some patients and supporters, rang the closing bell at NASDAQ.

November 2019

Let's Win's website surpassed 1 million pageviews.

May 2020

The PancChat reached nearly 2 million impressions.

November 2020

On the birthday of our late co-founder Anne Glauber, we held our Virtual Benefit remembering Jaclyn Hope Greenstein and honoring Steve Price, with over 750 attendees.

December 2020

We reached 500,000 users on the Let's Win website.

April 2021

We marked the 5th anniversary of our PancChat Twitter chat.
