



- Don't hesitate to ask questions!






Pancreatic Cancer: By the Numbers

- About 67,400 people will be diagnosed with pancreatic cancer in the US this year
- The average rate of occurrence in the US is 13.7% but for Black Americans that rate is 16.6%
- The 5-year survival rate is about **13%**
- · The symptoms mimic many other more common conditions
- The pancreas is deep in the body, so tumors are not found on a physical exam
- · Most people are diagnosed at a later stage of the disease
- The most effective treatment is surgical removal, but most patients are diagnosed at a too advanced stage
- At this time, there is no easy screening test for pancreatic cancer






Where is the Pancreas?





Types of Risk Factors

Pancreatic cancer cases are on the rise.

Risk factors:

- Lifestyle and behaviors
- Diseases
- Inherited or genetic mutations





Risk Factors: Lifestyle

- Smoking
- Obesity
- Heavy alcohol consumption
- Aging





Risk Factors: Disease

- Diabetes
- Pancreatitis
- Pancreatic cysts





Risk Factors: Inherited and Genetic

- Family history
- Known mutations including:
 - BRCA1/2
 - PALB2
 - CDKN2A
 - Lynch syndrome
 - Others

*Only 10-20% of familial pancreatic cancers are caused by known mutations.





Screening

- What qualifies you for screening?
- What tests do you undergo?
- Are there surveillance programs?
- Should you get genetic testing?






Andy's Story

- Years of annual screening before diagnosis: 23
- Worked with an experienced doctor
- Surgeries: 1
- Rounds of chemo: 12
- Cancer detected in my body today: 0


